








A FRESH PERSPECTIVE

Discover year-end escapes in Krabi to inspire your new beginnings



Tubkaek Beach

As the year winds down, there's no better time to pause, recharge, and reconnect with yourself—and Krabi offers the perfect setting to do just that. This tropical haven combines serene landscapes, rich culture, and a gentler pace of life, creating an ideal backdrop for reflecting on the year past and setting intentions for the one ahead.

With its calming atmosphere and natural beauty at every turn, Krabi invites mindful exploration and restorative experiences. Whether you're seeking quiet moments, gentle adventure, or simply time to reset, the province has something to soothe every traveller's soul. End the year refreshed, renewed, and ready to embrace new beginnings.

1 TUBKAEK BEACH: THE ART OF DOING NOTHING

To indulge in dolce far niente, or the "sweetness of doing nothing," Tubkaek Beach, especially in the morning, is an ideal spot, peaceful and serene, and the warm evening sunsets are a can't-miss. This two-kilometre stretch of fine sand is peaceful and far less crowded than other popular beaches, making it perfect for sunbathing, reading, chilling, or simply just letting the tranquility recharge your soul. Don't forget to bring a mat or towel, drinks, snacks, and sun protection.

Tip: Adventurous souls can make the 1-2 hour hike nearby Dragon Crest Mountain for a forest-bathing session followed by magical views.

2 AO THALANE MANGROVES: WONDERS NEVER CEASE

For a mild adrenaline boost, book a private kayaking tour in the Ao Thalane Mangroves. The journey takes you through towering limestone karsts and hidden lagoons as well as canyons and dense mangrove forests. You can also spot wildlife, with possible encounters with macaque monkeys, crabs, kingfishers, and other rare birds. If you start in the afternoon, you can end your excursion with a breathtaking sunset—a perfect way to make the trip unforgettable.

Tip: The tour typically lasts 4-5 hours in the sun, so be sure to bring sunscreen, a hat, sunglasses, and insect repellent. Drinking water and light refreshments are usually included, but you may want to bring along a few of your favourites.





NONG THALE LAKE: DAYBREAK AT ITS BEST

Krabi isn't just about beaches—you can also relish a magical morning by the serene Nong Thale Lake. This lesser-known, community-based tourism spot lets you enjoy early morning bamboo rafting through a romantic mist, witnessing dawn breaking over karst mountains, and watching local fishers at work. From February to April, the lake becomes even more enchanting as red Indian oak leaves carpet the water and basins. Nearby restaurants also serve authentic local dishes to fuel your morning.

Tip: For guided tours and activities like bamboo rafting or kayaking, contact the community center in advance to reserve your spot.

4 BAAN NAI NANG VILLAGE: **SHOULDER-TO-SHOULDER WITH** A LOCAL COMMUNITY

Another compelling ecotourism destination in Krabi is Baan Nai Nang Village, just 20 minutes from the city centre of Krabi. Not long ago, the community lost much of its natural value due to irresponsible fishing and land concessions, but with a commitment to sustainability, locals restored these invaluable resources and are now moving toward carbon neutrality. Here, you can experience local agriculture, beekeeping, village-style dishes made with fresh ingredients, and charming Thai-Muslim culture—alongside boat rides and kayaking through Krabi's off-the-beaten waterways. Tourism at this spot is based on a shared enterprise model, where profits are reinvested into community development.

Tip: It is recommended you contact the community in advance for a visit, which can be accessed via www.facebook.com/baannainang



S KLANG ISLAND (KOH KLANG): A QUAINT LITTLE VILLAGE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE RIVER

Situated in the heart of the Krabi River, Klang Island is home to a small community where traditional ways of life are maintained. Just a 10-minute boat ride from the city centre, you'll find yourself in a peaceful setting surrounded by lush greenery. The island offers slow-paced activities and workshops, including boat and cycling tours, motorcycle rides, handicraft sessions such as batik painting, and the chance to savour authentic local dishes.

Tip: To reach Klang Island, hire a long-tail boat from Chao Fah Pier or Tara Park Pier, with the latter offering more frequent services. Once on the island, you can also get around tuk-tuk.

6 KOH HONG: THE REAL PARADISE ISLAND

If you prefer to spend your day trip on just one island instead of hopping between a few, Koh Hong, with its powdery white beach-shaded by trees, is ideal for lounging, swimming in a dreamy lagoon or exploring the coastline by kayak. A highlight is the well-built viewpoint after a steady stair climb, so it's best to take your time for the rewarding views at the top. Most tours include meals and snacks in their packages, so you can relax without worrying about refreshments in this remote setting—just soak up the scenery and let nature work its magic.

Tip: It is best to catch the boat early in the morning to watch sunrise and experience the island with smaller crowds.



7 Amari Vogue Krabi




PENANG'S TIMELESS CHARMS THAT KEEP YOU COMING BACK

This small island always deserves a second (or third) visit

As the year draws to a close, Penang offers the perfect backdrop for reflection and new beginnings. A place where history and modernity intertwine, this captivating island reveals new treasures with every visit—from heritage shophouses and striking murals to elegant mansions and storied clan houses. It's a destination that rewards those who return, inspiring travellers to start the year ahead with curiosity, culture, and a renewed sense of wonder.





O ARMENIAN STREET

In the 19th century, Armenians travelled in search of new trading opportunities, and some were drawn to Penang, a bustling commercial port under British control. The Armenian here has always been small, but its economic influence was strong enough to leave a lasting mark. Today's Armenian Street was formerly known as "Malay Lane" before the arrival of the Armenians, later occupied by mainly Chinese immigrants.

Part of George Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Armenian Street was once the heart of the Armenian settlement, featuring mainly Peranakan-style architecture with touches of British and Chinese influences. Today, it has been enhanced with contemporary creativity, brimming with street art. These playful installations keep visitors coming back, and they are so numerous, you'll definitely find something you didn't see the first time.

2 SUN YAT SEN MUSEUM

With so many Chinese immigrants in Penang, Sun Yat Sen moved the Tongmenghui headquarters—the predecessor of the Chinese Nationalist Party, also known as Kuomintang—to Penang in 1910. He received local support and saw the island as a strategic base for his movement. Sun Yat Sen lived in Penang and operated from 120 Armenian Street, a 19th-century shophouse with authentic Straits Settlements architecture, a long interior, and an inner courtyard.

Thousands of miles from China, Penang played a significant role in Chinese history, including the 1910 Penang Conference, fundraising, and planning the Second Guangzhou Uprising. While this attempt failed, it was part of the journey leading to the establishment of the Republic of China in 1911, spurring larger movements.

If you missed this museum on your first trip, spending time here offers a fascinating glimpse into how Penang contributed to history beyond its shores.

3 KHOO KONGSI AND CHEAH KONGSI CLAN HOUSES

The "clan", or "kongsi", culture places importance on family lineage and ancestral ties. Serving as community centres, clan houses offer a unique window into local history. In Penang, Khoo Kongsi and Cheah Kongsi are the two most prominent clan houses, each with its own unique qualities, and both helped shape the lives of Chinese immigrants on the island. Though they may look like temples, their purposes went far beyond religious functions, especially for travellers far from home, as they allowed communities to give and receive support from abroad.

The Khoo Kongsi clan house, or Leong San Tong Khoo Kongsi, in Cannon Square is intricately decorated inside and out. The clan's lineage can be traced back almost 700 years. This grand building is in Southern Fujian architectural style and functions as a mini village. Also originating from Fujian province, the Cheah Kongsi clan house, or Seh Tek Tong Cheah Kongsi, on Armenian Street shows clear British colonial influence, with an Interpretation centre serving as a museum.

Despite their longstanding significance, these clan houses are tucked away, so you may have missed them on your initial visit, so be sure to catch them on your return to explore even more of Penang's rich cultural heritage.

4 THE CLAN JETTIES OF PENANG (WELD QUAY CLAN JETTIES)

There are clan houses, but there are also clan jetties. The Clan Jetties of Penang, also known as the Weld Quay Clan Jetties, are a collection of water villages along the southeastern coastline of George Town, featuring quaint wooden houses perched on stilts.

Construction of these floating communities began in the 19th century, following Penang's massive growth as a trading hub. Most early settlers were Hokkien people who worked as labourers, dockworkers, and fishermen, living away from the growing affluence of city-centre homes. Like other Chinese settlements, these communities were organized by clan, resulting in names such as Lim Jetty and Yeoh Jetty. Descendants of the original residents still live here, and Chew Jetty is the most tourist friendly. Be sure to visit the jetties requires care and respect. There are also cafés and shops along the jetties to keep you entertained and refreshed.

5 PINANG PERANAKAN MANSION

Pinang Peranakan Mansion is another of Penang's historical gems, showcasing the lives of the Peranakans—acculturated Chinese people that make up this rich cultural tapestry. Built in the 1890s with traditional Feng Shui principles in mind, this opulent house originally belonged to Chung Keng Quee, a wealthy Chinese businessman and influential figure in the area. With its intricate touches and eclectic style, the mansion is often praised as a masterpiece of Peranakan architecture and design.

About a century later, the building was purchased by a property developer who is also a proud Peranakan. The mansion was refurbished and now houses antiques and collectibles, turning it into a museum that offers a glimpse into Peranakan life for visitors from around the world.

Pinang Peranakan Mansion is more than just a photogenic spot. It's an indelible part of this region's culture. So, if you missed it on a previous trip, be sure to add it to your next itinerary.



4 FESTIVE DISHES TO SAVOUR IN HANGZHOU

Elevate your New Year with some of Hangzhou's culinary icons

Dongpo Pork

Modernised yet culturally well preserved, Hangzhou, the capital city of Zhejiang province, is home to three UNESCO World Heritage Sites. It is an ideal destination for the New Year, offering contemporary convenience while showcasing cultural richness, soul-soothing scenery, and a culinary tradition that is second to none, making it perfect for special celebrations, particularly for food enthusiasts.

Originating in eastern China, Zhejiang's culinary traditions are distinctive from other parts of the country: light, mild, and refined, rather than oily or spicy as many may be accustomed to. With West Lake and numerous rivers, seafood is a staple ingredient, often cooked in ways that accentuate freshness and subtlety-hallmarks of Zhejiang food culture. Hangzhou was also the residence of the prosperous Southern Song dynasty, and the wealth and sophistication of that bygone era still echo through the city today, which clearly carries over into its cuisine.

Several dishes have stood as the city's culinary signatures for centuries, many of which have since become beloved across. China and are easy to come across. Yet nothing compares to experiencing this storied cuisine at its place of origin. Whether you are in town for the New Year or another special occasion, here are four celebratory dishes in Hangzhou that you should not miss. They are more than just delicious; they are edible history.



West Lake Fish in Vinegar

WEST LAKE FISH IN VINEGAR (XI HU CU YU)

Thickly glazed in sweet and sour sauce, this fish dish is indulgent and distinctive, featuring the local catch—grass carp straight from West Lake—prepared in a way that removes its excretions, so the flesh does not smell muddy, and instead reveals a subtle crab-like aroma. Despite its dark colour and thick appearance, the glossy gravy contains no oil, only vinegar and other condiments, making it light enough to complement the one-of-a-kind flavour of the fish. The origin of this dish can be traced back almost 900 years to the Southern Song dynasty, making it a historic speciality of the area.

According to longstanding Chinese tradition, savouring a whole fish at New Year is considered auspicious, so West Lake Fish in Vinegar is certainly a celebratory dish and a must-try when visiting Hangzhou.

DONGPO PORK (DONG PO ROU)

Dongpo Pork is another famous Hangzhou speciality. Beyond its heavenly tenderness, the dish has a fascinating story: it was created by the poet-artist-statesman Su Dongpo, a significant literary and cultural figure of the 11th century, wrote the poem Ode to Pork during his political exile in Huangzhou, finding beauty in simple pleasures amid hardship.

Pork belly cubes are patiently braised in soy sauce, ginger, scallions, Shaoxing wine, and sugar to achieve the perfect balance of flavours. While sweet and salty versions of braised pork are common, Dongpo Pork is distinct for its refined method: the pork belly must be neatly cut, no additional water is added, heat is carefully controlled, and time is allowed to work its magic.

Dark red and layered, Dongpo Pork is widely consumed during New Year celebrations for its symbolism: red is an auspicious colour in Chinese culture, and the fat-meat layers represent abundance.







Beggar's Chicken •

BEGGAR'S CHICKEN (JIAO HUA JI)

The name Beggar's Chicken may sound questionable, but in fact it is considered an auspicious food at special celebrations, and even a luxury. One of Hangzhou's specialties, Beggar's Chicken comes with a fun story, a dramatic presentation, and the most tender texture and mouth-watering aromas.

Folklore has it that a beggar in Jiangsu province once stole a whole chicken, but being too poor to afford kitchenware, he cooked it by wrapping it in clay and lotus leaves, then roasting it in a fire-lit hole, and the result was stunning. Another legend states that an emperor, possibly Emperor Qianlong of the Qing dynasty, was strolling casually along the street when the fragrant dish caught his attention. The beggar let the emperor try his humble creation, and the emperor was so impressed that he elevated it to an imperial court delicacy. Since Jiangsu borders Zhejiang province, Beggar's Chicken soon became notable in Zhejiang and especially in its capital, Hangzhou, where the dish was further refined in line with other Zhejiang cuisines.

Nowadays, the chicken is still served covered in clay and/or lotus leaves, and it can be found in many high-end restaurants. In Chinese culture, a whole chicken represents completeness and unity, and the story behind this unique slow-roasted chicken makes it a sign of good fortune.



LONGJING SHRIMP (LONGJIN XIAREN)

Another signature dish of Hangzhou is Longjing Shrimp (Longjing meaning "Dragon Well"), which, like many of the city's specialities, was once an imperial court cuisine originating in the Qing dynasty. It is closely associated with Emperor Qianlong who, while travelling in disguise through the Longjing area of Hangzhou, took shelter from the rain in a woman's house. She offered him a warm cup of tea made with freshly picked tea leaves, and he was so mesmerised by the fragrance that he secretly pocketed some. Soon after, while dining at a modest inn and ordering simple fried shrimp, he passed the leaves to the waiter to make tea. The waiter, catching sight of the imperial robe hidden beneath his outer garment, panicked and rushed to inform the chef. The nervous chef mistakenly sprinkled the tea leaves into the shrimp instead of green onions, and the emperor fell in love with what he tasted. The accident became the birth of the iconic dish that has lived on for centuries, with its unique harmony of the briny scent of shrimp and the aromatically bitter notes of the tea.

In Chinese culture, shrimp symbolises joy and liveliness, while tea represents health and vitality. With its imperial connection, the dish also embodies good fortune and refinement. On top of that, it tastes sublime—all the more reason why Longjing Shrimp remains a celebratory favourite.



Phuket for the Curious Traveller

Refresh and reflect: offbeat Phuket experiences to begin the year with a sense of wonder

When Phuket comes to mind, it's easy to imagine sun-kissed beaches and turquoise waters. Yet, as the year draws to a close, the island reveals another side—one filled with discovery, new experiences, and opportunities to start the year afresh. From tranquil forests and cascading waterfalls to engaging museums and immersive adventures, Phuket invites travellers to step off the beaten path and explore its hidden gems. A New Year's escape here is the perfect way to refresh the spirit, ignite curiosity, and set the tone for the months ahead.

1) Old Phuket Farm

To experience agriculture first-hand, Old Phuket Farm in Thalang District is a lesser-known yet charming estate that shows how people on the island lived before urbanisation. From rice planting and rubber tapping to tin panning and more, you can give it all a try yourself, or simply meet the buffaloes, which have always been key to traditional Thai farming. Foodies can also dive into Thai cooking in a traditional house and tuck into some savoury Phuket dishes. Just make sure to book ahead, as reservations are required.

Whether you are travelling with kids, friends, or older family members, this is an experience everyone can enjoy, and it's hands down one of the most unique things to do in Phuket. Since most activities are outdoors, don't forget your sun protection!

2 Bang Pae Waterfall &3 Gibbon Rehabilitation

On the east side of Phuket, Bang Pae Waterfall is a medium-sized cascade surrounded by dense forest, forming part of Khao Phra Thaeo National Park. It's a refreshing alternative to the beaches, particularly on weekdays (it's a popular weekend escape for locals, so expect more visitors then). But there's more to this area than just the waterfall.

Gibbons were once plentiful in Thailand, but sadly they've been heavily poached and exploited as pets. Fortunately, groups are working to rescue these primates from the poor conditions created for human entertainment. One such initiative is the Phuket-based Gibbon Rehabilitation Project, run by the Wild Animal Rescue Foundation of Thailand (WARF). The project works to reclaim gibbons from captivity, provide care, and return them to their natural habitat.

Running for decades, it has overcome many challenges and successfully reintroduced these almost-extinct animals to the jungle, where they are now repopulating on their own. Visitors can also stop by the Centre for Conservation Education, within walking distance of Bang Pae Waterfall, for an educational experience. Entrance fees apply and advance booking is required.

4 Phuket Mining Museum

Long before it became the busy tourist destination and business hub we know today, Phuket earned its wealth primarily from tin mining. The industry has centuries of history on the island, flourishing in the 17th century with the involvement of the British, Portuguese, Dutch, and Chinese. Phuket's abundance of natural resources gradually shaped the island's development, though in those days it looked very different—scarred by man-made craters, many of which were later transformed into lakes.

What is now Kathu District was once the heart of Phuket's mining boom. Today, it is home to lively neighbourhoods and the Phuket Mining Museum. The museum's exhibitions are highly visual and accessible, featuring miniatures, models, old machinery, and vivid depictions of life during the tinmining era. Visitors may be surprised at just how strongly tin mining, indirectly but decisively, contributed to the island holiday destination Phuket has become.

If you're looking to escape the sun for a while, this museum makes for an excellent stop, with engaging displays that bring the island's past to life for all ages.

5 Chinpracha House

Situated close to the Strait of Malacca, Phuket is one of the cities most heavily influenced by Peranakan culture, which is a fusion of Chinese and Southeast Asian traditions. During the tin-mining boom of the 18th and 19th centuries, an influx of Chinese men, mostly from southern China, migrated to the island in search of business and labour opportunities. Many settled, married local women, and preserved their traditions while blending into local ways of life.

To explore this rich cultural heritage, Chinpracha House is a mansion-turned-museum that is as beautiful as it is full of stories. Among the oldest Sino-Portuguese buildings in Phuket, it remains much as it was in the past. Built in

1903 by Pitak Chinpracha, a descendant of a Chinese immigrant from Fujian province, the house has been carefully preserved and is still owned by the Chinpracha family. From the spacious living room with its central pond to the quaint kitchen and elegant bedrooms, the intricate details and antiques never fail to impress.

Whether it's your first or fifth visit to Phuket, immersing yourself in Peranakan culture adds a new layer to the experience. As you wander through Phuket Old Town, you'll see more than just its surface beauty—you'll also come to appreciate the traditions that give the city its unique charm and distinctive cuisine.

6 VAR LIVE – VR Games Park Phuket

If it's a rainy day, or simply too hot to be outside, VAR LIVE VR Park is a great indoor option, especially for those who love an adrenaline rush and crave an immersive experience. 



WHERE MEMORIES GROW

For Pompeth and his wife, Supicha, the sea is more than scenery—it's a rhythm of family life. Living in Nakhon Pathom, the closest coast is Cha-am and Hua Hin, so the family often finds themselves on the road to the seaside with their four-year-old daughter, Prin. Since she was just two, Hua Hin has been her playground. Together, they've tried pretty much all resorts, pool villas, and holiday homes—each weekend becoming a quest to discover where their daughter might be happiest.





Under the sprawling shade of "Grandpa Chamchuri," a majestic rain tree whose branches spread wide as if to embrace every passer-by, the heart of Bangkok slows to a gentler rhythm. This is **Benchakitti Park**: an oasis of water, trees, and sky, where mornings arrive crisp with promise and evenings close in a glow of lights and laughter.

For some, it is the start of the day—full of energy, discovery, and connection. For others, it is the place to unwind, to let go of the day's rush and breathe in serenity. Just ten minutes' walk from Shama Lakeview Asoke Bangkok, Benchakitti is more than a park. It is a sanctuary that quietly reshapes lives.

FUMIKO'S MORNING DATES

For Fumiko Kawasaki, a long-stay resident at Shama Lakeview Asoke Bangkok for almost a year and a half, weekends often begin with what she fondly calls a morning date with her husband. "We walk together around the lake, take photos by the fountains, sometimes we try the paddle duck-shaped boats," she says with a laugh. "And afterwards, we go for brunch at a café. It's just us, no phones, no distractions. We really talk to each other—about his work, about my MBA, about little discoveries. I think it makes us closer."

For her, these morning dates are about more than exercise. They are about presence—giving time and space to conversations that too often get lost in busy modern life. "In the park, we're off our phones. We're just walking and talking. Morning feels positive, and so do we."

These moments have been part of a larger lifestyle shift. "I used to be a night person," Fumiko admits. "But my husband changed me. At first it was a bit challenging—I liked staying up late. But now I love mornings. They feel healthier, better, and they make the day seem longer and more hopeful."

Her husband's early-bird rhythm has drawn her into new habits, from morning walks to joining the Sabai Run Club, a light-hearted Sunday gathering of joggers and walkers. The club divides into three groups—fast, medium, and slow—but even within these, there are smaller sub-groups: the very fast, the steady, the



gentle joggers, and those who simply walk and enjoy a chat with new friends. "Sabai means comfortable in Thai, and that's exactly the feeling," she says. "There's no pressure. You can go at your own pace. And that freedom is important, not just in running but in almost everything—from learning music, studying a new language, to even starting a new job. If you push yourself too hard at the beginning, it becomes a negative experience. But if you proceed at your own pace, it stays enjoyable, and it becomes part of your everyday life."

It was this welcoming spirit that reshaped her lifestyle. "I wasn't an exercise person," she says. "But the group inspired me. Now I walk three kilometres every morning at Shama's gym. It's become a refreshing habit—grounding, energising, and good for my health."

For Fumiko, mornings at Benchakitti are a balance of companionship and community. Sometimes she joins the crowd at dawn, sometimes she simply strolls with her husband—but always, she leaves feeling renewed.

SMILE'S EVENING CALM

When the sun sets and the day's demands soften, Kanyaphat "Smile" Chootimakorn finds her own rhythm in Benchakitti Park. An accounting staff member at Shama Lakeview Asoke, she has spent seven years working across the street from this green escape. For her, the park is not about the dawn but about dusk.

"Every morning the BTS sky train is always packed and chaotic," she says. "So after work, I come here. It's completely different—open, calm, peaceful. Like stepping into another world."

Sometimes she invites a friend for what she calls their "sharing sessions." They walk slowly around the vast lake, talking freely and releasing the day's worries. "We listen to each other, we laugh, we take photos. It feels lighter after." Other evenings, she comes alone

with headphones, letting music guide her pace as the city hum fades into the background.

The park, she explains, transforms at night. "They turn on the lights, and it becomes beautiful—almost magical. The fountain sparkles, the Skyline Bridge glows, and sometimes, if it has just rained, you see a rainbow in the sky. It's perfect for photos, but it's more than that—it's a feeling of calm."

When her walk is done, Smile often treats herself at a nearby café. "There's a lovely %Arabica at Queen Sirikit Convention Centre. I'll have an iced latte, no sugar, with a dessert. Even at eight in the evening. It's my little indulgence before heading home."

For her, the park is a release. "Life is full of things to think about, but here, I don't have to think much. I can just be—relaxed, chill, myself."

A PARK FOR EVERY MOOD

Morning or evening, together or alone, energetic or restful—Benchakitti Park proves that one place can hold many meanings. For Fumiko, it is a fresh start, a chance to form healthy habits and strengthen her bond with her husband. For Smile, it is a sanctuary of calm, where the day's stress dissolves into laughter, light, or quiet reflection.

Both find more than exercise here. They find connection—with themselves, with others, and with the rhythms of a city that, even in its busiest heart, knows how to pause.

And with Shama Lakeview Asoke Bangkok just across the road, guests too can enjoy this freedom to explore. It's only a 10-minute walk away, or you can take the shuttle to Queen Sirikit Convention Centre for even easier access. Whether it's an energising run at sunrise or a peaceful stroll under the evening glow, Benchakitti is always within easy reach.

Here, beneath the generous branches of Grandpa Chamchuri, Bangkok offers something rare: the chance to feel refreshed, unhurried, and free.





A HOME FOR ALL, **PAWS INCLUDED**

For Thitinad, the journey began in grief. When her father passed away from COVID-19, the family home in Bang Na became unbearable every corner filled with memories too heavy to bear.

"I once walked past the laundromat I used to visit with Dad," she recalls. "I just broke down in tears." Once known for her bright smile, she found herself hollowed out, unable to stay among the shadows of the past. Every street corner seemed to whisper his absence, each familiar

place an aching reminder of what she had lost.

Her partner, Pawarisa, suggested that a true change of environment might help. So they left the house behind and began moving from hotel to hotel, three Maltese dogs in tow-Kimi, Akradecha and Matasearching for somewhere to feel at peace.

It wasn't that the hotels weren't perfect. They were. The sheets crisp, the service polished, the butlers always on hand. But that



was the problem. "Sometimes perfect protocol can make you feel a bit off," she admits. "They'd send a plate of chocolates when something went wrong. It looked flawless, but it didn't feel human."

And for the dogs, the struggle was greater still. Most hotels treated pets as an afterthought: sealed windows, no balconies, restrictions in lobbies and restaurants, even separate entrances to avoid "disturbing" other guests. Walking through the back entrance while other guests strolled

the lobby freely left them feeling unwelcome, even diminished. "It was like being second-class citizens," says Pawarisa. "We couldn't share the same spaces with everyone else."

One evening, driving through Bangkok, the warm glow of Shama Yen-Akat caught their eye. Unlike the faceless towers they had been drifting through, this one looked alive, almost beckoning. A few days later they checked in, and everything changed.

Here, the balconies opened to sunlight and birdsong, the "kids" could watch the world outside, and the staff welcomed them with genuine affection. "The dogs are happy here," Thitinad smiles. "And when they're happy, we're happy."

This was the turning point. For once, the couple didn't feel like temporary guests; they felt part of a community. The staff weren't just service providers—they became friends, remembered names, asked after the dogs, and offered sincere apologies instead of rehearsed gestures when things went wrong. "That sincerity means more to me than a silver tray of chocolates," says Thitinad.

The excellent location mattered too. Shama Yen-Akat was close to expressways, near shops and restaurants, and highly convenient for Pawarisa's work. They tried different room types, finally settling on the smallest—because that was where Kimi, their eldest girl, slept best. For Thitinad, the pets' comfort always came first.

Over time, what began as a refuge became something far deeper. Thitinad brought small treats for the staff, picked up Burmese words to connect with some team members, even helped a new security guard manage incoming cars.

Her earlier doubts slowly faded away. Would neighbours pry, as in a condominium? Would the pets be treated as a nuisance? Would hospitality mean protocol instead of compassion? Each fear was quietly erased—not with grand gestures, but with small, genuine acts of kindness.

"At other hotels, when I checked out, I just settled the bill and drove away. Here, it would feel like leaving family."

Even today, though they could easily afford to purchase a house, the couple have no desire to move. The bonds they have built, the comfort of the community, and the joy of seeing their pets so content outweigh the appeal of owning bricks and mortar.


The lesson is clear: true hospitality isn't measured in flawless service or luxury. It's found in the everyday—sincere smiles, patience, and the reassurance that both people and pets are truly valued.

Two years on, Shama Yen-Akat is no longer simply a residence. For Thitinad and Pawarisa, it is sanctuary, community and home. And in the heart of bustling Bangkok, where countless lights glow in the night, one shines brighter—because it holds their story.
